



CRIMINOLOGY

Aim

The study of crime is intended to enable you to assess critically the causes of criminality and society's responses to it.

Course Content

You will take three units of study:

- **Unit 1: Infamy: A Modern History of Crime.** This three credit unit will give you a foundation in the study of crime by adopting a case-study approach where you will learn about notorious criminals from the recent past.
- **Unit 2: Introduction to Criminology.** This six credit unit aims to develop your understanding of the theory and methodology associated with the study of crime. This will include the various approaches that exist for measuring, recording and assessing criminal behaviour.
- **Unit 3: Introduction to Criminal Justice.** This six credit unit aims to develop your understanding of the different parts of the criminal justice system in England. In addition, the unit will address developments in the control of crime by exploring the notions of punishment, rehabilitation and restorative justice.

Approaches to Study

Criminology is a contemporary subject. As such, it is anticipated that you will be able to refer to current events as part of the discussion and deliberations that we will inevitably engage in. Furthermore, you will be referred to and use both classic and contemporary studies of crime as a way of framing your thoughts and ideas.

Assessment

The assessment for the course is carried out across all three units and may include written assignments, case studies and seen examination.

Recommend Reading and Preparation

You should ensure that you are engaging with news and current events as they are presented in the mass media. In addition, you should approach your study of crime with an open mind and be prepared to have your personal views challenged.

Qualification Requirements in English and Maths

If you are aiming at progressing into higher education you will need to have English and Maths GCSEs at Levels 4 – 9 or Level 2 Functional Skills for university entrance. If you do not already have these you can take these as part of the Preparation for Access package of courses in the year preceding your enrolment on Access at no charge.

The Access to HE Diploma course is available full-time over one year (approx. 10 hours per week over two days).
