



PSYCHOLOGY

Aim

This module will introduce you to some psychological theory and encourage you to develop critical analysis skills.

Course Content

You will take five units of study:

- **Unit 1: Introduction to Psychology**
A three credit unit which introduces the subject and considers the purpose and study of psychology. You will be introduced to the major theoretical approaches and will evaluate research in terms of ethical considerations, using the work of key theorists.
- **Unit 2: Bio-Psychology**
In this three credit unit you will look at the key features and functions of the brain, the spinal cord, neurons, neurotransmitters and the automatic nervous system. You will consider the effects of drugs and their effectiveness on these structures, as well as the impact of brain damage on specific functions within the brain, using case studies to illustrate these.
- **Unit 3: The Psychology of Health**
This three credit unit help you to understand psychological theory in relation to health and illness. You will critically assess how ill health can impact behaviour, and explore different theories of coping with illness. Aspects of the nature nurture debate will be covered and you will also look at theoretical explanations for Dementia.
- **Unit 4: Abnormal Psychology**
You will evaluate psychological definitions of abnormality in this three credit unit, considering the validity and reliability of methods of definition and classification. Disorders schizophrenia and obsessional compulsive disorder.
- **Unit 5: Psychology and Therapy**
This three credit unit is designed to help you understand key models used to explain mental illness and key therapeutic approaches used for mental health issues. Using the same disorders as those covered in the Abnormal Psychology unit. It focuses on the application of therapeutic practice, whereas the former unit focuses on academic interpretation and measurement of mental illness.

Approaches to Study

As well as teacher-led classes there will also be plenty of discussions and activities to support and develop your subject knowledge and independent research skills, using a range of current sources for Psychology and associated research approaches.

Recommend Reading and Preparation

You are not expected to have studied psychology previously but will need to be able to communicate clearly and be confident with numbers. Useful preparation would be reading relevant articles in broadsheet newspapers and watching documentaries on current issues. Expect to be challenged!

Qualification Requirements in English and Maths

If you are aiming at progressing into higher education you will need to have English and Maths GCSEs at Levels 4 – 9 or Level 2 Functional Skills for university entrance. If you do not already have these you can take these as part of the Preparation for Access package of courses in the year preceding your enrolment on Access at no charge.

The Access to HE Diploma course is available full-time over one year (approx. 10 hours per week over two days)
