



SOCIOLOGY

Aim

The study of society is intended to enable you to assess critically the world in which we live.

Course Content

You will take several units of study:

Unit 1: Introduction to Sociology

This three credit unit will introduce you to the core concepts and major theoretical perspectives of Sociology. You will learn how sociological theory is applied to contemporary issues.

Unit 2: Sociology of Mass Media

You will consider how the media is organised, and what role it plays in the structure of society. Relevant theory will be evaluated, as well as media representation of social factors such as social class, gender, ethnicity, age and disability.

Unit 3: Sociology of Religion

In this three credit unit you will be introduced to key definitions and concepts of religion, and how major sociological perspectives can be used to analyse the role of religion. You will also consider the secularization thesis.

Unit 4: Sociology of Education

A three credit unit which focuses on the role of education from the major sociological perspectives. You will also analyse how social factors impact on educational attainment, and spend time identifying and evaluating key contemporary debates with reference to recent education reforms.

Unit 5: Sociology of Poverty

This unit will help you to understand definitions and core concepts in the study of poverty, to recognise sociological explanations of poverty and the different theoretical approaches to the reduction of poverty.

Recommend Reading and Preparation

You should ensure that you are engaging with news and current events as they are presented in the mass media. In addition, you should approach your study of society with an open mind and be prepared to have your personal views challenged.

Qualification Requirements in English and Maths

If you are aiming at progressing into higher education you will need to have English and Maths GCSEs at Levels 4 – 9 or Level 2 Functional Skills for university entrance. If you do not already have these you can take these as part of the Preparation for Access package of courses in the year preceding your enrolment on Access at no charge.
